With that appointment comes an end to many years of dedication to our community from recently retired Captain, Shire Freeman Mr John Twaddle. John is still part of the Waroona brigade and continues to give to his community.

HARD WASTE COLLECTION HAS BEEN SCHEDULED

The Shire of Waroona wishes to advise residents that the hard waste collection has been scheduled for early December 2021 which will allow residents to have a clean-up prior to the holiday period.

The Shire is moving to a new collection practice which will see the collection carried out by a contractor. This will result in a quicker and more streamlined operation with options to recover and recycle materials to reduce landfilling, however this means the collection timeframe is dependent on contractor availability.

The Shire apologises for any inconvenience. We will continue to post updates on the Shire website and social media leading up to the collection. In the meantime, residents are advised to hold off on placing material on their verges until further notice.

FREE RECREATIONAL VEHICLE SHORT STAY AREAS

At the September Ordinary Council Meeting, Council reviewed the Free Recreational Vehicle (RV) Short Stay areas and expanded the initiative to all year round!

Three sites will have dedicated areas for RVs to stay for free – Preston Beach, Drakesbrook Weir and Waroona Showgrounds (conditions apply).

Recreational Vehicles (RV) must be a caravan, bus, coach or similar that is designed and used for recreational use that are:

- Fitted with an operable integrated black water waste system with a holding tank; and
- A grey water waste system that is capable of capturing grey water without it being deposited on the ground (an integrated holding tank is not required).

The following conditions apply to all three sites:

- The time frame between one period of stay and the next period by the same RV is 5 consecutive nights;
- Erecting a fixed annex is not permitted;
- Clotheslines external to an RV are not permitted;
- Accessing any power outlet is not permitted; and
- Camp or cooking fires are prohibited at all times.

RV use and camping in areas other than the three sites below is prohibited.

RV use and camping in the incorrect area will contravene the Shire's local laws and the Caravan Parks and Camping Grounds Act 1995, and can be dealt with by modified penalties.

RECREATIONAL VEHICLE FREE STAY AREAS



Preston Beach

Located off the Preston Beach carpark with an entry point off Mitchell Road as illustrated below.

Additional conditions include:
Maximum period of stay is 48 hours only.



Drakesbrook Weir

Located in the Drakesbrook Weir carpark with an entry point off Weir Road as illustrated below.

Additional conditions include:
• Maximum period of stay is 24 hours only; and
• Maximum of 5 RVs at any one time.



Waroona Showgrounds

Located on the old basketball courts on South Western Highway with entry points off Millar Street and Parnell Street as illustrated below.

Additional conditions include:
• Maximum period of stay is 24 hours only; and
• Maximum of 5 RVs at any one time.



With more people choosing to wander out yonder, these free RV short stay areas will encourage visitors to Waroona and boost local tourism and economy.

Local Government Act 1995 Shire of Waroona

Proposed Extractive Industries Local Law

Notice is hereby given that Council at its Ordinary Meeting on Tuesday 24 August 2021 resolved to make the abovementioned local law.

The purpose of this local law is to prohibit the carrying on of an extractive industry in the district, unless by authority of a licence issued by the local government, regulate the carrying out of the extractive industry in order to minimise damage to the environment, roads and other peoples' health and property, provide for the restoration and reinstatement of any excavation site and to provide penalties for contraventions of the local law. The effect of this local law will be that any person wanting to carry on an extractive industry will need to be licensed and will need to comply with the provisions of the local law.

A copy of the proposed local law may be inspected at or obtained from the Shire's office at 52 Hesse Street, Waroona, between 8.30am and 4.00pm Monday to Friday. A copy is also on the Shire's website www.waroona.wa.gov.au

LOCAL CONSTABLE IN DOCUMENTARY

Local constable Tiarna Eades (pictured above Mooriel) will feature in an NITV documentary series called Our Law. Filmed across regional WA, including Peel, the series will follow the lives of indigenous police cadets as they begin their careers. Constable Eades, who has just graduated and been posted to Waroona, has been chosen as Peel's representative. This documentary follows a pilot screened last year at the Warakurna police station, which is entirely run by indigenous police officers and is the only one of its type in WA.

The filmmakers – made up of producers Sam Bodhi Field and Taryne Laffer with director Cornel Ozies – took their preparations seriously. "We went out to Warakurna without any cameras, three months in advance to shooting and just got to know people, got to know the lay of the land," says Cornel, an Indigenous man from the Kimberley. "We made sure everyone was on board and we weren't stepping on anyone's toes and it was done in the right way."

That approach mirrors the Indigenous cops that Our Law focuses on. When they moved into the town, which lies just over four hours drive west from Uluru, Sergeant Wendy Kelly and Senior Sergeant Revis Ryder put a lot of emphasis on learning the local Ngaanyatjarra language. "They're not from that country, they're from the Noongar nation in Perth," explains Cornel. "So, when they come into the land they're fresh as well. They have to learn the language. They have to learn cultural protocols."

In places like Warakurna, English is a second, maybe even third, language. "The language and culture are very strong out there. So learning the language has given Wendy and Revis a toolkit to help diffuse situations when they do go out on call."

Filming will begin in Waroona later this year but in the meantime you can catch the 30 minute pilot Our Law on SBS On Demand.
